Mr Ryan—We brought up some of the biggest gentlemen in Limerick for knocking and things of that sort. Ald Hall—It is very well known how a watchman can be squandered.

Mr Ryan said he did not attach much importance to the occurrence. Ald Hall—The whole thing to lifies what has been again and again expressed here.

Mr Herbert—We have that report. It will go before the public, but I want to know what good it will do.

The High Sheriff—Oh, oh. Mr Herbert—What good will it do to have all this exposing taking place. It will do no good, but on the contrary it might make people unfriendly.
