We regret, says the *Cork Constitution*, to announce the death, at her residence, North Mall, of Miss Alice Gubbins. She was most benevolent and philanthropic in the truest sense of the word. The world knew little of her great kindness and assistance she often afforded to those in distress. She was equally modest as she was generous, and no one will ever know the extent of her liberality. Many public institutions have lost a friend, and there are families who will mourn the death of the good lady. At St Peter's Church on Sunday morning, the rector made special reference to the death of Miss Gubbins, and spoke of her long connection with the parish, to which she was a liberal contributor. Appropriate hymns were sung, and the Dead March was played on the organ.

**CATTLE LIFTING IN THE COUNTY LIMERICK.**

Kilmallock, Monday. Three in-calf heifers, the property of a small farmer named Pat Donoghue, of Lisvernane, Co Tipperary, were missed from his grazing farm at Ballyscaddane, Knocklong, on the 22nd instant. He at once set out to discover them, sometime conveying word to the nearest police barrack, and could find no trace of them till on the 25th he found two of them at a place called Uregare grazing on the roadside. It is now strongly alleged these cattle were stolen, and were driven to Dromin Fair on the 23rd inst; that the best of the three was sold, being value for £11 or so, and the other two were let go. Up to the present the police have had no trace of the stolen property.

**WATER COMMITTEE.**

The usual weekly meeting of the Water Committee was held to-day. Mr P O'Malley presided, and there were present—Mr Patrick McDonnell, Mr Michael McDonnell.

Mr M J DeCoursey, Secretary; Mr Watson, Superintendent; Captain Wyld, Fire Brigade, were also in attendance.

The chief business was the consideration of tenders for supplying a hydrant to Barrington's Hospital.

The various tenders having been gone through, were referred to Mr Corbett, City Surveyor.

Mr Forrest, in connection with the new water rent for stables, presented a return of the number of horses in the city, the total being 772, which included 86 at the artillery barracks.

Mr Michael MacDonnell objected to the proposed rate for the consumption of water in stables. People who keep a horse to drive out on Sundays should not be charged at the same rate as those who have horses for other purposes.

Mr DeCoursey—The return was ordered by the Committee.

Mr Michael MacDonnell—I am not speaking for myself, but others who have complained very strongly of the proposed charge.

The Chairman—Every person having a horse will they come under the same head?

Mr Forrest—Yes. Mr Patrick MacDonnell said he considered the water too high altogether.
