MR. MACDONAGH'S BOOKS.

The next volume of the New Irish Library, of which Sir Charles Gavin Duffy is the editor and Mr Fisher Unwin the publisher, will, says the Drily Chronicle, be "Bishop Donle: A Biogra-phical and Historical Study," by Mr Michael MacDonagh. The subject of this study has been truly described as the greatest Irish Roman Cutbodic prelate since the Beformation. He was a prominent figure in the Catholic Emancipation movement and in the subsequent sgitstion for the abolition of tithe—rivailing Daniel O'Connell in popularity—and was chiefly instrumental in establishing the present system of national education, and in having the English system of poorrelief extended to Ireland. Dr Doyle created a great sensation in 1824 by advocating the union of the Churches, which at that time were carrying on in Ireland a furious polemical campaign; but it met with the hostility of his brethren in the Episcopacy.
