MR. MACDONAGH'S BOOKS.

The next volume of the New Irish Library, of which Sir Charles Gavin Duffy is the editor and Mr Fisher Unwin the publisher, will, says the Daily Chronicle, be "Bishop Doyle: A Biographical and Historical Study," by Mr Michael MacDonagh. The subject of this study has been truly described as the greatest Irish Roman Catholic prelate since the Reformation. He was a great spiritual force, but he was more remarkable still as a politician and publicist. He was a prominent figure in the Catholic Emancipation movement and in the subsequent agitation for the abolition of tithes—rivalling Daniel O'Connell in popularity—and was chiefly instrumental in establishing the present system of national education, and in having the English system of poor-relief extended to Ireland. Dr Doyle created a great sensation in 1824 by advocating the union of the Churches, which at that time were carrying on in Ireland a furious polemical campaign; but it met with the hostility of his brethren in the Episcopacy. Mr MacDonagh is also about to publish "The Book of Parliament," a historical, an-ecdotical, and descriptive work, dealing with the human side of Parliament, so to speak, from the General Election to the Dissolution.

JOHN BRIGHT PEABODY AND THE KILLALOE BOATMAN.

In a book just published under the title of "Angling Holidays," Mr C W Gedney tells the following story of the late Mr John Bright and his old fishing crony Peabody, the philanthropist:—"They used to fish the Shannon at Castleconnell, and one day they came up for a turn on Lough Derg. Two of the chief boatmen of Killaloe joined forces, and did themselves the honour of rowing these distinguished visitors. And a severe day's work those rowers had. Arrived at the landing stage late in the evening, there was the inevitable policeman on the bank. John Bright accosting him, said, 'What is the proper price to pay these boatmen, constable?' He replied, 'Seven shillings and sixpence, sir, but some gentlemen give them ten shillings.' John Bright, turning to his crony, said, 'I have no change, Peabody; have you three half-crowns?' DEATH AND FUNERAL OF THE REV FATHER HOGAN, O.S.A.

The death, at the early age of 82 years, of the Rev Father Hogan, O.S.A., Limerick, which occurred very unexpectedly on Sunday morning last, created deep regret among all classes in the city. The deceased clergyman had, by his excellent qualities as a priest, gained the warm affection of those with whom his sacred office brought him into contact. Father Hogan was attending to his duties on Saturday night, being then in his usual health. As a preacher, the deceased held a prominent position, his discourses being learned and impressive. He was in the eighth year of his ministry, and was a zealous and devoted priest.

The remains were removed from the Priory to the church yesterday, and until their removal this morning large numbers visited the church. Requiem Mass was celebrated at eleven o'clock.
