ATTEMPTED MURDER OF A BRITISH OFFICER.

A serious outrage has been committed on the Tibetan border on Lieutenant J R Gausson, of the Bengal Cavalry. While on a sporting expedition his party was attacked by several hundred Tibetans, Lieutenant Gausson himself being so severely handled that he fell from his horse in an unconscious state. In the end he and his companions were, however, rescued by a number of natives, who crossed the frontier to render assistance.
