LIMERICK SUMMER ASSIZES.

The County Grand Jury will be sworn in on Thursday next at 9.30 o'clock before the High Sheriff, Colonel the Hon Lionel Massey, for the discharge of the fiscal business of the Summer Assizes. The commission for the city and county will be opened on Saturday morning at eleven o'clock before Mr Justice Holmes and Mr Justice Murphy. The criminal calendar is not a heavy one. From the city—Patrick Connors and John Mason will be indicted for fraud in connection with the distribution of fuel fund tickets. There are also three cases of burglary. The following are the cases from the county—Michael Magner, perjury; John Ambrose, shooting at; Patrick Madigan, homicide; Edward Donohue, stabbing; James Butler, homicide; William Fogarty and Patrick Donohue, indecent assault; John Broderick, larceny; John Cussen, larceny. The civil business of the Assizes will be very light, there being, so far as can be ascertained, no records for hearing. The appeals number about 50.

THE RECENT STABBING OCCURRENCE NEAR NEWPALLAS.

DEATH OF THE INJURED MAN.

The man, James Kearney, who was seriously stabbed about a week ago, as alleged, by another farmer named James Hourigan, died from the effects of his injuries on Sunday night last. The deceased, it appears, had frequent bickerings with Hourigan about a passage, which both parties claimed the right of using, and on Thursday, the 18th, the feud which existed, took the form of violence. In the row which ensued Kearney received a stab of a penknife in the abdomen, the wound being so serious that his medical attendants could entertain no hope of the man's recovery, and, as stated, death occurred on Sunday night. Hourigan, it is stated, absconded, but was arrested on the day preceding Kearney's death. On yesterday he was brought up before Mr Hickson, R.M., at the City Courthouse, on the charge of murder, and some evidence having been taken, the prisoner was remanded to Petty Sessions. Head Constable Soden, Newpallas, represented the Crown.

SEIZURE OF BOATS AND NETS ON THE SHANNON.

On Sunday morning, about three o'clock, Mr Hall, Inspector of the Limerick Conservators, when on duty in the steam launch, came upon three boats and five nets, which had been fishing on the river at Cronagh. The men who had occupied the boats fled on the approach of the launch. The boats were taken up the river to Corbally. Prosecutions are likely to follow as the result of the seizure.

IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE.

At the meeting of the Improvement Committee Mr John McBirney (McBirney and Co.) was present and requested permission to run a pipe from their premises across Barrington street to additional new premises which they are erecting at the rear of Bowl's Hotel. The ware room they are erecting measures 50 feet by 40 feet, and another 53 feet by 28 feet, for manufacturing purposes, and they intended to light these by electricity. It was necessary to put a pipe under Barrington street to carry electric current from the retail warehouse to these new premises.

It was decided, on the proposition of Mr Hall, seconded by Mr Nelson, that the request be granted, subject to the approval of Mr Spillane and Mr Spillane.

THE WATCH COMMITTEE.

A report was received from Messrs Hayes, inspectors of the Night-watch, in reference to the recent robberies. Mr Hayes stated that Watchman Holohan was suspended because he had been absent from his beat during the robbery in Miss Ryan's pawn office.

Mr Dundon said it was perfectly clear that the watchmen were not doing their duty with the facility with which this robbery was committed.

Mr Clune thought Holohan no worse than the whole lot of the watchmen. The watchmen are paid £1,400 a year, and it was a black and white financial arrangement of the Corporation that the Ratepayers Association might use their attention.

Alderman Hall proposed that Holohan be suspended because of his neglect in leaving his beat.

Mr Nelson seconded the proposition, which was unanimously passed.

It was decided to censure Watchman Holohan and Murray for not being more active on the same night.

Mr Ryan said he heard nothing about the robbery when he saw it in the papers on Monday. He then went to the proprietor, but he did not want anything to be said about it.
