DEATH OF MR MACDONNELL, J.P., TOWN CLERK.

With feelings of the deepest r gret, we

nounce the death of Mr Robert MacDonnell, J.P.,

Town Clerk, which occurred yesterday at his residence, Fairy Hill, Parteen. About ten days ago, up to which time he was attending to his official duties, a melady from which he had for a considerable time suffered, re-attacked him. His illness was not regarded at first as very serious, and his death came somewhat unexpectedly. By death one of the best known citizens has been he was largely identified in commercial life, his father, the late Mr John M Donnell, being ext-misively engaged in the limit rade, and was the proprietor of a fleet of trading vessels. The late Town Clerk continued to carry on the business until about four years ago, when, on the death of Mr Alfred Wallace, he was elected to the position of Town Clerk by the casting vots of the then Mayor (Mr D F M Namera). The decisace confidence of the wide experience as a traveller, made him a most interesting acquaint-ance. In his time he had been connected with every public board, in the city, and the ability which he was well-known to possess, enabled him to fill with credit the offices of honor and distinction which were conferred upon him. As a member of the Harbour Board, for a great many years, the decised showed an active interest in any movement tending towards the welfare of the harbour. He was one of the supporters of the Harbour to the Harbour Commissioners, who previous to that time were described as Bridge Commissioners, and possessed only limited. embred from amongst us. In his earlier days previous to that time were described as Bridge Commissiaters, and possessed only limited powers over the port. He was elected on the first Board of Harbour Commissioners in the first Board of Harbour Commissioners in the year 1868, and continued a member up to a few years ago. The late Mr MacDonnell was for many years a member of the Town Council, and on the 1st of December, 1870, he was elected to the Mayorality for the following year, the other candidates being Alderman Mahony and Town Councillor Parker. In the first poll Mr MacDonnell got 14 votes, Alderman Mahony, 12, and Town Councillor Parker, 7. In the final poll he defeated Alderman Mahony by a majority of one, Town Councillor Synon having declined to with Edwing his Mayorality, Earl Spencer, who was then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, visited the city, and was presented with an address by the Town Council, and in his year of office many other and was presented with an address by the Town Council, and in his year of office many other ecremonies took place, the late Mr MacDonnell on all occasions acquitting himself with characteristic ability. In the same year the Corporation presented an address to Colonel W. Monsell, M.P., (subsequently Lord Emly) congraturating him on his appointment as Postmaster-General. Not the least interesting event, and one which attracted great attention amongst municipal bodies, was a langthened and heated controversy between the Mayor of Limerick and the Mayor of Cork as to whether Limerick or Cork should have precedence as a municipal body. The question precedence as a municipal body. The question arose out of the action of the Lord Mayor of Dublin, who on the occasion of a banquet gave Mayor of Cork repudiated. A vote of thanks was passed to the Lord Mayor for "having suswas passed to the Lord Mayor for "having sustained the recognised right of Limerick and its Mayor and Corporation to precedence on all public occasions, under its charter which bears date prior to that of Cork." After a long correspondence the matter was referred to Sir B. Bonrke, Ulster King-at-Arms, but the question remained undecided, the Mayor and the Corporation maintaining the right of the municipality of Limerick to precedence over Cork. It was all of Limerick to precedence over Cork. It was all oduring the late Mr MacDonnell's year of office that the Town Council petitioned the Lord Lieutenant the Town Council petitioned the Lord Lientemant to have divisional police barracks erected in different parts of the city in the same places as before, "the concentration of the police barracks in William street leaving life and properly unsafe in the city." In that year a deputation from the Farmers Club wasted on the Town Council to ask them to Club wa'ted on the Town Council to ask them to support the movement for Hoine Rule, and a public reception was given to Mr Button the occasion of his visit to le ture on the subject. Other events of a stirring nature also occurred during Mr McDonnell's Mayoralty, and it was universally admitted that the dulies which he was called on to perform were discharged with singular ability. The deceased gentleman was about 64 years of age. The utmost sympathy is felt for his relatives in their sad bereatement. The funeral will leave his late residence at Fairy Hill to-morrow at 12.30, proceeding by the Long Pavement and the Ennis road for the New Cemetery. Cemeterv.
