FUNERAL OF THE LATE LADY MASSY.

The funeral of the late Lady Massy took place yesterday. The remains were removed from Hermitage, Lord Massy's residence, shortly after ten o'clock for interment in the family vault at Stradbally Church, Castleconnell. The cortege was of a very representative character, and the large attendance of sympathisers from the neighbourhood of Castleconnell was an indication of the esteem and regard in which the late Lady Massy and her family are held by all classes and creeds. The remains were enclosed in a mahogany shell, encased in lead, the outer coffin being of polished oak, with massive brass mountings, and elegantly finished. The breast plate bore the following inscription:—

THE RIGHT HON. LADY MASSY.
Born November 9th, 1836.
Died July 25th, 1893.

The coffin was covered with beautiful wreaths. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. A. Trevor Benson, rector of the parish, and some impressive hymns were rendered by the choir, in charge of Professor Blackett, the organist.

THE DELAY IN THE MAILS. RESOLUTION OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. A. W. Shaw, J.P., vice-president, in the chair, was held yesterday for the purpose of directing attention to the serious inconvenience to the trade of the city caused by the frequent missing of the connection at the Limerick Junction, where in such circumstances the mails have to lie for more than two hours and a half, when they are taken on by the train arriving here at 1.25. Mr. John Boyd, secretary, read a letter from the General Post Office, London, dated 17th April, and stating:—"I am directed by the Postmaster-General to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th inst, and to state that the question of the occasional delay of the mails at the Limerick Junction, to which you called attention on a former occasion, is receiving careful consideration. A further communication shall be made to you on the subject as soon as the inquiries now being made are completed."

No further correspondence, however, has since taken place.

The following resolution was now unanimously adopted by the meeting:—"Having regard to the serious loss to the trade of the city in consequence of the frequent late arrival of the morning mails, the Chamber of Commerce again respectfully requests the Postmaster-General to make arrangements for running a special train from Limerick Junction to Limerick when the morning train is late. Copies of this to be sent to the Postmaster-General, and the county and city members and the Chief Secretary for Ireland."

For three successive days—Tuesday, Wednesday and to-day—the connection with Limerick Junction has been missed, but the mails were taken round via Charleville, with the result that they were delivered here at least an hour earlier than if they were allowed to remain over for the next ordinary W & L R train for Limerick. At the same time, the greatest inconvenience is caused to local traders, not to speak of the people of Co. Limerick, Clare, and Kerry, by this present state of affairs which occurs with such frequency.

DR O'DWYER AND THE CASTLE.

The following letter has been addressed by the Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, to His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant:—

May it please your Excellency—On the 15th inst I had posted in the letter box attached to the 3.10 p.m. train from Limerick a letter addressed "The Clerk of Privy Council, the Castle, Dublin," containing my objection to scheme 90 supplemental re the Roxboro Road School Endowment.

On the 17th inst I received a letter from the Assistant Under Secretary to the effect that my letter did not arrive until the 16th inst, and that by that time your Excellency had already provisionally approved of the scheme.

I immediately wrote requesting that the envelope of my letter should be examined so as to trace its progress by post marks.

For 5 days I did not get so much as an acknowledgment of that letter. I wrote again on the 22nd inst to inquire if it was proposed to give me any answer, and stating that in the meanwhile the Post Office authorities, with whom I had communicated, had asked to see the envelope of my letter of the 15th.

On the 24th inst I at last received an acknowledgment of my letter of the 17th inst, expressing the regret of the Lords Justice that the envelope of the letter could not be found, and their belief, in which I full concur, that it had been destroyed.

Now, I have no doubt whatsoever, that my letter was delivered in due course at the Castle, but why it was not presented to the Privy Council even after the postal delivery of next morning, the second after its arrival in Dublin, is as unintelligible to me as that the officials, seeing, as they must have seen, on their own showing, the want of correspondence between the date written in the document by me, and the time of its delivery should destroy the only evidence as to the facts of the case.

But I submit that it is unjust and unreasonable to deprive me of my rights on that account, and that the provisional approval given by your Excellency to the scheme on the 16th inst, should be withdrawn until such time as my objection, which was lodged within the period fixed by the Act has been heard.
