The Government do not want to endanger the national education of the country, and they wish to guard against the national schools being tempted to give up that character and classify themselves as certified schools, and therefore, Mr Balfour said "the Government had thought it right so to fix the amount of the registration fee that, while it would be of substantial assistance to the certified schools, it would not induce the national schools to cease to belong to their present class. The proposal is an effort to settle a "burning question," and it remains to be seen how far it will be regarded as a satisfactory solution
