## SUDDEN DEATH OF A LIMERICK COMMERCIAL TRAVELLER.

Mr FF Cullinan, Coroner, held an inquest at Daly's Hotel, Ennistymon, yesterday, on the body of Mr Michael Noonan, traveller for the establishment of Mr Michael Egan, Limerick, was found dead in his bed at the hotel on Wednesday morning. It appeared from the evidence that the deceased left Limerick at ten minutes past three for Ennis, but being in delicate health and looking badly, he had previously been requested by Mr Moylett, another official of the firm, not to proceed. He arrived at Ennistymon that even ing, and complained of being unwell, and three times during the night the boots in the hotel had to come to his assistance in his bedroom, the last occasion being at four o'clock in the morning, and when he went up at eight o'clock Mr Noonan was dead. Medical evidence showed that death had resulted from failure of the heart's action and from vomiting, the latter indicating a deceased condition of the liver and stomach. The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony. The remains were removed to Limerick for interment.

## THE GABBETT SCULLS AT DURHAM.

The race for the Gabbett Sculls, over the full mile and a quarter regatta course on the Wear at Durham, was decided yesterday afternoon. The race was founded some ten years ago in memory of Mr Gabbett, the popular classical tutor at Durham University, who lest his life in making the perilous assent of the Matterhorn.
