The funeral of the late Lady Massy yesterday. The remains were removed from Hermitage, Lord Massy's residence, at ten o'clock for interment in the family vault at Stradbally Church, Castleconnell. The funeral was of a very representative character and a large attendance of sympathisers from the neighbourhood of Castleconnell was in evidence. The esteem and regard in which the late Lady Massy and her family are held by all classes of the community is shown by the following inscription:—

THE RIGHT HON. LADY MASSY
Born November 9th, 1836
Died July 25th, 1896.

The coffin was covered with beautiful flowers. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Trevor Ben-on, rector of the parish.
