FATAL FALL FROM A SCAFFOLD.

Yesterday a mason, named John Quinlivan, of Taylor street, who was engaged with others in building work at Barrington's Hospital, fell from a scaffold, and sustained such injuries that he died a few hours later. An inquest was held last evening by Mr C. roner DeCoursey and a jury, of which Mr John Condon was foreman. Sergeant Hiekie, Mary street, conducted the inquiry for the police, and Mr James Gaffney, solr, appeared for the contractors, Messrs Ryan and Son. William Doherty, who was also engaged in the building, stated that Quinlivan, having completed a course of masonry, stepped across it from one platform of the scaffolding to another, and placing his foot on some unsettled brickwork, he dropped to the ground, a depth of about forty-five feet. Dr Haran deposed that he immediately attended the injured man, whom he found to be suffering from a broken spine, a broken arm and broken leg. He had also sustained two scalp wounds, and died from shock, the result of these injuries. The jury returned a verdict according to the medical testimony.

DISCHARGE OF A CLARE PRISONER.

James Morey, who was convicted in 1893 of shooting at Mr Weldon Charles Moloney, a land agent and registrar to the County Court Judge of Tipperary, has been released from Maryborough Convalescent Prison.
