#### DEATH OF EX-HEAD CONSTABLE STEVENSON.

We regret to announce the death of Mr  
Stevenson, ex-Head Constable E.I.C., which oc-  
curred to-day at the County Limerick Infir-  
mary, under peculiarly sad circumstances.  
It appears that some weeks ago  
the deceased in cutting a corn caused it to bleed,  
and having neglected the sore for some days,  
inflammation set in, followed by blood poison-  
ing. He was admitted to the County Infirmary,  
and was attended by Dr Gelston, Dr Kennedy,  
and Dr Fogerty. The disease, however, rapidly  
ripened, and although everything that medical  
skill could suggest was done, it was found that  
recovery was impossible. The deceased had  
served for a number of years as a sergeant, in the  
City and County of Limerick, and on his promo-  
tion to the rank of Head Constable was trans-  
ferred back to the city and stationed in John  
street. He was an active and obliging official  
was greatly esteemed by his superiors and very  
popular with the members of the force. Some  
time after retiring he obtained a position  
in the firm of Messrs Shaw and Sons,  
which he held until the accident which brought  
on his death befel him. Much regret is ex-  
pressed with his family in their great affliction.  
The funeral takes place to-morrow.
