note while he was under the influence of drink. This was the prisoner in the present case, who stated he should have had £10 about him instead of one pound found in his possession by the Castleconnell police. Two men named Collopy and Carr, who stated they lived in Limerick, were arrested, and the greater part of the £10 was found on them. They were remanded, and Nagle bound over to prosecute them at the next Castleconnell Petty Sessions. Head-Constable Feeney ascertained that Nagle, Carr, and Collopy, were in a public-house in the city on the morning after Cregan had been robbed, and they represented themselves as travellers en route to Killaloe. Nagle stated yesterday that he was only three weeks back from New York, and that he had had plenty of money, but that over £25 had been stolen from him at Castleconnell. He denied that he was concerned in the robbery from Cregan. The prisoner was remanded for seven days.

THE RECENT HOMICIDE IN LIMERICK.

Yesterday, before Mr Hickson, R M, Michael Connell was charged in custody with the manslaughter of his brother-in-law, Michael Kiely. About a fortnight ago the parties had a row in Old Francis-street after leaving a public-house, and this row appears to have been the continuation of another quarrel which they had earlier, during which it is alleged Kiely entered Connell's house and caused some damage. In the row in Old Francis-street, Connell and Kiely were seen wrestling, as it were, with each other, and subsequently after Connell had left Kiely was found with a depressed wound on the left front of the forehead, as if caused by the stroke of a stone. He was taken to Barrington's Hospital, where he was detained for treatment, and the operation of trepanning was performed, but he died after four or five days. Depositions having been taken, Connell was returned for trial to the Assizes.
