station, and was removed by him twice on the day in question; he was a common nuisance there.

The Chairman-Better summon him then as

you bave the power.

Mr Stuart-Well I did not want to punish the man if he kept away. The lady was annoyed at the mistake made, and this fellow increased it by trying to take away her luggage.

The cross case was then entered into, and Hennessy deposed that Nelson attempted to

hustle him off the flags in Hector street. He called him a ruffian and struck him a blow on the head with the lamp. He was in bed from Monday until Friday. He reported the matter at once to the police, and the Head-Constable told

him to summon Nelson.

In cross-examination witness denied he was put out of the platform when the 3 30 train arrived in that day, but he was at the 930. Head Constable O'Brien said Nelson, reported the matter after the occurrence, and admitted striking Hennessy. The latter also came to the barrack; he was bleeding profusely

In reply to Mr Hunt, witness denied telling Hennessy to prosecute; it was not a case in which they could prosecute, having regard to the cir-

cumstances.

The Chairman said there was no doubt in their minds that Hennessy waylaid Nelson and le very properly struck back at his assailant. Only that Hennessy got so severely cut on the occasion he would be for s-nding him to jail for a month. Under the circumstances they would take a lenient view of the matter and would fine him 5s and costs. He would also have to give bail to keep the peace, himself in £10 and two sureties of £5 each, or in default, one month's imprisonment. He would advise Mr Stuart to provecute him if he went again on the platform.

LARCENY. A man named Pat Dillon was brought up in custody charged with the larceny of a gold chain and the sum of 30s, the property of Mr Synan McAuliffe, Knock. The man comes from Labasheeds and is a farm labour-r

District Inspector Craig, Kildysart, prosecuted. Mr McAuliffe identified the chain found on the

accused as his property.

In reply to the Chairman, the prisoner pleaded

guilty to the charge.

The Charman said this was the best excuse for him as they would otherwise send him to the Cork Assizes for trial. He would have to go to jail for one month. The 30s, found on the prisoner would have to go to him as it was not identified.

The court adjourned.
