A SAD AND FATAL OCCURRENCE.

A lamentable drowning fatality occurred near Doon. Co Limerick, on last Sunday night. party from Emly, Co Tipperary, drove up on that day to see some friends near Doon on a post car, driven by the owner, James Kennedy, of Bartoose. Owing to the heavy rain on Saturday night and Sunday morning the floods rose to a great beight on Sunday afternoon. The dead river near Doon overflowed its banks, and the public road was under three feet of water. When the car was returning to Emly about 9 o'clock pm at Reaskavalla an angry flood barred their passage. They forced their way on until one side of came the Car into contact with guard wall. endeavouring In low extricate the car the horse became restive, and backed across the road into a gripe 7 feet deep at the time. The night was very dark, but the occupants of the car managd to keep their heads over water and shouted for help. Some neighbouring farmers hearing their cries ran to their assistance, and saved the four passengers and the horse, which had been freed from the car, with ropes, but poor Kennedy, who was a low sized, stout man, was drowned. No trace of him could be found until six o'clock on Monday morning, when his body was recovered in a standing posture in the bottom of the dyke alongside the post car. An inquest was held on deceased at a neighbouring farm house on Monday afternoon, and the body was brought back to Emly the same night. The greatest regret is felt for Kennedy, who was held in the highest esteem by the people of Emly.
