A SAD AND FATAL OCCURRENCE.

A lamentable drowning fatality occurred near
Doon, Co Limerick, on last Sunday night. A
party from Emly, Co Tipperary, drove up on that
day to see some friends near Doon on a post car,
driven by the owner, James Kennedy, of Bartoose.
Owing to the heavy rain on Saturday night and
Sunday morning the floods rose to a great height
on Sunday afternoon. The dead river near Doon
overflowed its banks, and the public road was
under three feet of water. When the car was re-
turning to Emly about 9 o'clock p m at Reaska-
valla an angry flood barred their passage. They
forced their way on until one side of
the car came into contact with a
low guard wall. In endeavouring to
extricate the car the horse became restive, and
backed across the road into a gripe 7 feet deep at
the time. The night was very dark, but the oc-
cupants of the car managed to keep their heads
over water and shouted for help. Some neigh-
bouring farmers hearing their cries ran to their
assistance, and saved the four passengers and the
horse, which had been freed from the car, with
ropes, but poor Kennedy, who was a low sized,
stout man, was drowned. No trace of him could
be found until six o'clock on Monday morning,
when his body was recovered in a standing
posture in the bottom of the dyke alongside the
post car. An inquest was held on deceased at a
neighbouring farm house on Monday afternoon,
and the body was brought back to Emly the same
night. The greatest regret is felt for Kennedy,
who was held in the highest esteem by the
people of Emly.

NATIONAL REGISTRATION OF PLUMBERS
