The Town Clerk said the bishop, who took greatest interest in the housing of the work- ing classes, had called on and asked him to bring section of the Act of Parliament dealing with these houses under the notice of the Council at the earliest possible moment. The Town Clerk then read the section, which stated that it should be the duty of the local authority to cause inspection to be made from time to time of the district with a view of ascertaining whether dwelling houses were dangerous or injurious to health, or unfit for habitation, and on a representation being made by the medical officer should forthwith take steps to close up such houses. He communicated on the subject to the Law Adviser, and he stated the 32nd section dealt with inhabited houses, and uninhabited houses were dealt with by another section.

Alderman Hall—He had unlimited power. The reading of the report of the inquest was a very interesting thing but agreeable reading for the public who expected we should do our duty without fear, favour, or affection or will. I believe the Corporation, taking the whole all, are anxious to do their duty, but we don't insist on having the officers do their duty. In the matter how we might gloss the matter over the public won't excuse us.

Mr Joseph Gaffney—The section states that the Local Authority should cause an inspection to be made of these houses in their district, that if not done, and if it was done that house would be there.

Mr Corbett, in reply to Mr Donnelly, said that the house was included in the Nicholas street improvement Scheme, and the notice in reference to it had been referred by the Sanitary Authority to the Council. He omitted to mention that at the inquest, it having escaped his notice.

Mr Nelson—Would you have served notice about that house only that it was included in the scheme?
