THE LATE LORD CLARINA. EXTRAORDINARY

The remains of the late General Lord Clarina will arrive in Limerick to-morrow from London, and will be conveyed privately to Elm Park, where they will lie over-night. The funeral will take place at eleven o'clock on Monday morning, the interment taking place within the demense, at a spot selected by the deceased nobleman some time before his demise.

The Times in its notice of the late Lord Clarina says:—" Eyre Challoner Henry Massey, fourth Baron Clarina in the Peerage of Ireland, was the eldest son of the third Baron, by Susan Elizabeth, daughter of Mr. Hugh Baron, by Susan Elizabeth, daughter of Mr. Hugh Baron, by Susan Elizabeth, adughter of Mr Hugh Barton, of Straffan, Co. VIOLENT ENCOUNTER OVER A DEAD WOMAN'S PROPERTY.

TEN ARRESTS.

A scene of a most extraordinary character took place yesterday in the New Road, Thomondgate, and attracted the utmost excitement in the locality. The occurrence was the result of rival claims for the property of a woman named Kate Meany, who kept a small public-house in the New Road, and whose death occurred on Thursday last. The husband died about seven years ago, and there having been no issue of the marriage, the widow was left in sole possession of the small, though comfortable house, which she held in fee simple, paying only £1 a year rent. Mrs Meany originally belonged to Gurtavilla, New Pallas, her maiden name being Ryan, and some time after her husband's death she became rather delicate, and being unable to business, brought in two of manage her business, brought in two of her nieces. Mary Dee and Josephine Heffernau, the children of her sister and brother, who continued to live with her and manage the affairs until Mrs M-any's death. It is stated that during all this time none of her husband's relatives exhibited any interest in the label. PERJURY IN A DIVORCE CASE. THE SENTENCE.

The trial concluded at the Old Bulley to-day of Margaret Williams and Thomas Lees, of Cardiff, who were indicted for conspiracy and perjury in the Divorce Court during the hearing of a case in which they were respectively respondent and co-respondent. In consequence of their denial of the husband's allegations, the latter's suit was dismissed. The jury found the prisoners guilty, and Mr Justice Hawkins sentenced them each to fifteen months hard labour, remarking that such cases should be severely dealt with.

A CAB DRIVER'S LAW SUIT.

Mr Justice Darling in the Queen's Bench today gave his reserved judgment in the case in which a cab driver sued Mr Simmons, an official of the Cab Drivers' Union, for damage caused by his having induced a cab proprietor to refuse to engage the plaintiff under a threat of calling his men out. The jury had awarded the plaintiff £5. but Mr Justice Darling, acting on the result of the House of Lord's appeal in the case of Allen v Flood, now gave judgment in favour of Mr Simmons with costs.

A BIG MONEY LENDING ACTION. JUDGMENT FOR DEFENDANT.

The Lord Chief Justice gave judgment to-day in the case in which Mr Samuel Lewis sought to

recover eleven thousand pounds from Lieutenant Spender Clay upon promissory notes, which the d-fendant signed jointly with Lord William Nevill, and which defendant alleged he was in dured to sign by a trick practised by Lord William. The Lord Chief Justice beid that under the circumstances in which the signature was obtained it was equivalent to a forgery, and accordingly gave judgment for the defendant, I beg to direct wit : cos's.

INQUEST ON MRS HALSTROM. At the inquest held at Cardiff last evening on the body of Mrs Halstrom, who was found shot in a boarding house on Wednesday, the jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against some person or persons unknown.

TRAFFIC BLOCKED.

On the London and North Western Railway near Tebay, early this morning the axle of a goods train broke, throwing several waggons off the metals. Both lines were fouled, and all traffic stopped for some hours. The ten o'clock Scotch express from Euston, was delayed six hours.

THE RECENT MURDER OF AN OLD LADY NEAR PARIS.

EXTRADITION OF TWO FRENCHMEN.

At Bow-street to-day, two French subjects named Delion and Voillard were committed for extradition, charged with the marder of an old lady near Paris. When the warrant was read they refused to listen, declaring they were Anarchists and recognised no law. Evidence was given by the third Frenchman, Alfred Eugene Desine, their companion in the crime, who is under arrest by the French Government, and who was brought to England yesterday in charge of two English detectives.
