SAD FATALITY.—A very sad fatality occurred
on Saturday evening. A respectable farmer
named John O'Brien, who resided between Castle-
connell and Annacotty, was proceeding home,
and when nearing the bridge at Annacotty the
horse shied and Mr O'Brien was thrown out of
the car, the wheel passed over his head, and in-
flicted such injuries that death took place in the
course of a few hours, notwithstanding all that
medical skill could do.

THE HORSEBREEDING COMMISSION.

It is stated that the Irish Horsebreeding Com-
mission, of which Lord Dunraven is chairman,
has concluded the taking of evidence, and pur-
poses to begin a visit of inspection to the con-
gested districts of Ireland on the 13th of this
month. The commission will begin its inspection
in Donegal. So far the evidence offered to the
commission has been remarkably conflicting, and
the members are desirous of ascertaining the
facts by actual inspection.

ROW IN JOHN STREET.—On Sunday evening a
dispute arose in John Street between a man
named Thomas Higgins and a youth named
Carroll, and stones were thrown. The mother of
one of the combatants named Johanna Carroll
intervened, and received a blow of a stone on the
head. She was taken to Barrington's Hospital,
and found by Doctor Haran to be suffering from
a compound fracture of the skull, and was de-
tained in the hospital. Thomas Higgins, who,
it is alleged, flung the stone which struck the in-
jured woman, was arrested and is detained on
remand.
