NOBLE GIFT FOR THE IRISH POOR.

£25,500 FROM AMERICA.

About eleven years ago a Lurganman named James Darragh, who had amassed a large fortune in America and India, returned to his native town, and made a bequest of £20,000 to the local branch of the Society of St Vincent de Paul. Immediately afterwards he was ordered abroad in impaired health, and died at Cairo, Egypt, whence his remains were brought to Lurgan and interred in Dougher Cemetery. While the bequest was made in Ireland, the money was still in America, and the result of the suit in the New York courts was made known by wires in Lurgan on the 4th instant. The sum of £25,500 is to be placed at the disposal of the charity referred to, for the benefit of the local poor.

Not only is the native population of France stationary, but the number of foreigners seeking naturalisation is markedly on the decrease. During the past year the number of naturalisations which have been registered under the law of 1889 is over 22 per cent. less than in the preceding year, and is smaller than that of any year since the law was passed. It is a remarkable fact that, with the exception of the Chinese—only three of whom became Frenchmen in 1896—the English show the greatest unwillingness to change their nationality for that of France.
