DEATH OF MR. JAMES RYAN.

We announce with much regret the death of an old and valued member of the staff of this journal, Mr. James Ryan, who passed away at his residence, Denmark-street, on Thursday evening, after a brief illness. Mr. Ryan was for over 30 years connected with the Typographical department of the *Limerick Chronicle*, and for the past sixteen or eighteen years occupied the responsible position of Foreman. He possessed a thorough knowledge of his business, was a man of great taste and judgment, and while his health permitted proved himself most energetic in the discharge of his duties. By his employers as well as those who worked under him he was held in the highest esteem for his never-failing courtesy and unswerving rectitude and fidelity. Mr. Ryan's death at the comparatively early age of 54 years is deeply regretted by all with whom he was associated, and deep sympathy is felt with his family in the affliction which has befallen them. The funeral which took place to-day for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery was largely attended, Mr. E. H. Poe Hosford, Rev. J. Dowd, the staff of this and other newspaper offices and various printing establishments in the city being present, and there were in addition numerous personal friends of the deceased who attended to pay a last mark of respect to his memory.
