DEATH OF A LIMERICK LADY ABROAD.

The *Bairnsdale* (Melbourne) *Advertiser* of Tuesday, 23rd February, has the following:—"We regret to announce the death, which took place on Sunday morning at her residence, River View, Bairnsdale, of Mrs Robert Bull, at the very advanced age of 82. Deceased, who was very great y respected, came to Bairnsdale over 30 years ago with her husband, Mr Robert Bull, who founded the saddlery business in Main Street, which is still being carried on under the original title of R Bull and Sons, by Joseph Bull, J P, and his brother, Henry. The late Mr Robert Bull predeceased his wife 22 years, being then 67 years, and was interred in the family burying place in Bairnsdale cemetery, where the body of his wife was laid yesterday. The deceased lady, who, like all her relatives, was a native of the county Limerick, Ireland, retained her faculties to the last, and continued to take a very active interest in the domestic concerns by which she was surrounded. The largeness of the funeral cortege yesterday testified to the universal respect in which the deceased lady was held and the sympathy which is entertained for her relatives in a bereavement that is acutely felt."
