THE LATE MR DANIEL O'CONNELL.—"R O C"
writes:—"Mr Daniel O'Connell, youngest son of
'the Liberator,' whose death at the age of 81 is
announced in *The Times* of June 16, told me that
he had often heard his great uncle, Maurice
O'Connell, of Darrinane, who died in 1825, aged
98, speak of his grandfather, John O'Connell
of Darrinane, whom he well remembered. John
O'Connell died in 1741, having served as a captain
in the Irish Army of James II, and, according to
Sir Bernard Burke's County Families, 'signalized
himself at Derry, the Boyne, and Aughrim, and has
been included in the capitulation of Limerick.'"
