Ir is a very curious incident in the political history of the country that the principal topic discussed at last Saturday's meeting of the Cabinet is understood to have been the silver The Government would appear to have their hands full of complications in almost every part of the globe. The Eastern question, in so far as it relates to the arrangements for terms of peace between Turkey and Greece, is not yet at rest. The military operations on the North-West Frontier of India are sufficient in themselves to shooth the attention of the Cabinet, to the exclusion of minor matters. The fate of Crete is undecided. The Turkish troops are there still, and likely to remain there. No governor has been appointed, but the Sultan insists that the governor must be appointed by him, that the Turkish garrison be increased and the inhabitants disarmed. A German paper has even suggested that the army of Edhem Pasha might be employed with advantage to pacify the island. At home, the Marquis of Londonderry thinks himself justified in attacking the policy of the Government, and endeavours to discredit Mr. Chamberlain. England in the meantime is calmly picking up territory here and there. The Egyptian Army is looking after the Mahdi's dominions, and we have just added a region called Nupi, a trifle of only five hundred thousand square miles, to our dominions, and probably two other empires in Africa are to be brought within the sphere hands, it is an extraordinary sign of the peaceful prospects attending British activity that when the Cabinet met for the first time since Parliament was adjourned, the principal subject to engage the attention of Ministers has reference to certain bi-metallist suggestions and the propesals of Senator Wolcott and his colleagues. It may therefore be taken as granted that the nation has confidence in the ability and armness of the Prime Minister. He has kept the peace of Europe during a period of pre-longed anxiety, when the war clouds seemed to be gathering in all directions. He has been successful in endeavouring to suppress savage rule on the Nile. The largest army that India has ever seen since the Mutiny is gathered on the North-West province to suppress a rising of claus inhabiting the mountainous region between Afghanistan and India. He has added an immense district to the British dominions, and England in his hands holds a higher place amongst the nations than she held under his predecessor. There appears to be no anxiety pressing upon the minds of Englishmen at present though the principal members of the Government have had no easy times of it since they entered upon office. Consequently the Silver Question is at present engaging the attention of the Cabinet. It is not exactly known what proposals Senator Wolcott has submitted to the Government, but it seems that the opening of the Indian mints was the concession most seriously pressed. The Press Association says:—" It is understood that the Cabinet on Saturday afternoon considered the Silver Question in pursuance of pledges given in their name by Mr. Balfour and the Chancellor of the Exchequer in the House of Commons in March last year when a Parliamentary resolution on the subject was unanimously his colleagues still maintain the position then taken up, to the effect that they cannot alter the gold standard of the United Kingdom; but they have in the interval consulted the Indian Government with regard to the promised reopening of the Indian mints to the coinage of silver. The reply received from the Executive in India is understood to be strongly adverse to that proposal. It may be added however, that the question is not finally settled. There is reason to believe that, owing to the difficulties raised in India, and to influential opposition from other quarters, the Cabine feel unable to give an immediate undertaking for the reopening of the Indian mints; but they are apparently not indisposed to entertain further negotiations on the subject It may therefore be expected that, as the
