TIPPERARY GUARDIANS AND THE SEED SUPPLY ACT.

At the usual weekly meeting of the above guardians, which was largely attended, Mr John Cullinan (chairman) presiding, on the motion of Mr Murnane, seconded by Mr E O'Dwyer, it was resolved to adopt the Seed Supply Act generally for the union, and decided to consider the quantities of seed and amount of loan required on that day four weeks. Mr Stapylton remarked that the seed supplied in 91 was disgraceful. The Chairman said there was a slight improvement in the order this time, as the guardians themselves are to procure the seed; but in face of the immense debt due to Ireland from Eugland, as now proved to the hilt, he thought a demand should be made in a time of such general depression to get a seed supply gratis (hear, hear).
