certificates. The list will open on Monday, 20th  
Dec, and will close on Tuesday for London, and on  
the following day at noon for the country.

### TIPPERARY GUARDIANS AND THE SEED SUPPLY ACT.

At the usual weekly meeting of the above  
guardians, which was largely attended, Mr  
John Cullinan (chairman) presiding, on the  
motion of Mr Murnane, seconded by Mr E  
O'Dwyer, it was resolved to adopt the Seed  
Supply Act generally for the union, and decided  
to consider the quantities of seed and amount of  
loan required on that day four weeks. Mr  
Stapylton remarked that the seed supplied in '91  
was disgraceful. The Chairman said there was a  
slight improvement in the order this time, as the  
guardians themselves are to procure the seed;  
but in face of the immense debt due to Ireland  
from England, as now proved to the hilt, he  
thought a demand should be made in a time of  
such general depression to get a seed supply  
gratis (hear, hear).

covered with blood. Nine other parties, including  
the friends of both sides, were placed under  
arrest and escorted by the police, in charge of Dis-  
trict Inspector Hetreed, to William Street Police  
Barrack. When the house had been cleared the  
two nieces of the deceased woman were, by direc-  
tion of Co Inspector Hayes, allowed to remain  
in the house, and a number of police were placed  
on duty at the house for their protection. After  
a delay of nearly three hours the coffin containing  
the remains was removed to a hearse in waiting  
and started on its journey by Thomondgate and  
William-street for New Pallas, being accompanied  
the entire way by an escort of police.

In the afternoon Mr E F Hickson, R.M., at-  
tended at William street Barrack, for the pur-  
pose of holding a preliminary investigation into  
the occurrence.

District Inspector Hetreed appeared to prose-  
cute, County Inspector Hayes being also pres-  
ent.

The names of the prisoners are—Wm Ryan,

Sergeant Lloyd, Thomondgate, deposed that he  
had received intimation from David Dee that he  
anticipated a dispute would take place  
between parties named Stapleton and Ryan.  
Accompanied by Sergeant Riordan and  
Constable McCormack, he visited the house,  
where a dispute of a most violent char-  
acter was in progress between the parties inside,  
all the prisoners, with the exception of Patrick  
Sheehan and Daniel Dee, senr, being actually  
engaged in the encounter. The disturbance  
ceased on the arrival of an additional force of  
police.

Head-Constable Feeney and Sergeant Riordan  
also made statements.

Mr Hetreed asked for a remand. He stated  
there were two sections concerned, and that if the  
parties were not kept in custody, a further breach  
of the peace would likely arise.

All the prisoners, with the exception of Daniel  
Dee, senr, and Patrick Sheehan, were then re-  
manded in custody until Tuesday next. The  
prisoners were subsequently escorted to the  
county gaol.

Several parties injured in the riot were treated
