#### DEATH OF CENTENARIANS.

Norry Hanly, described as "one of the oldest  
inhabitants," passed away in her native village,  
Bruree, on Monday last, in the 104th year of her  
age. She had been in excellent health until ten  
days previous to her death.

The death is announced of Martin Walsh, of  
Fiddown, Tipperary, who had reached the fine  
old age of 102 years. Deceased was engaged on
