Two report of the Brecutive Committee of Lady Cadogan's Textile Exhibition gives an able and full account of the present condition, and fature prospects of Irish textile manufactures Lady Cadogan took advantage of the many possibilities of the present year for the purpose of promoting an exhibition in Dublin during the month of August, the exhibits being limited to six classes, namely, linen and option manufactures, woollen manufactures, including homespun, lace and crotchet work, poplin and silks, needlework and embroidery, and finally hosiery. As the result of ns, scattered broadcast through the land, 192 manufacturies, including convents, sont in specimens of their industries, representing 255 exhibits of all classes. exhibition was opened on the 19th of August by the Duke and Duckess of York, and during the nine days that it was open it attracted over 20,000 visitors. The report deals with the various change of exhibits, and as the element of competition was excluded there is no mention reads of individual specimens. Each department is dealt with as a whole, but it cannot be said to be representative of the utmost effort that Irish manufacture is capable of, because owing to the shortness of the notice there was not sufficient opportunity afforded manuers of forwarding novel designs. The anilia tion of linen and cotton is pronounced to be the most brilliant that has yet been got tegether. It suffered, however, from the drawthat the shirt making and collar industry of Londonderry, which supplies all the markets in the world, and at which thousands of hands patiaually employed, was unrepresented at the Exhibition.
