SUDDEN DEATH IN A CHURCH.—An awfully
sudden death occurred in the city this afternoon.

DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.—Longevity is noted
in Clare. We have been informed that on the
18th instant Mary Pilkington died at Lahinch
"at the advanced age" of 105 years. She lived
in Lahinch for 49 years, and visitors to this now
fashionable resort took a great interest in hear-
ing reminiscences of her childhood and youth.
She had a very clear intellect, and remembered
the rebellion of 1798. Our correspondent also
states that there are three or four inhabitants in
Lahinch each being close on 100 years of age, and
looking hale and healthy notwithstanding the
weight of years upon them.
