During the champagne luncheon which followed, the Knight's health was proposed by Rev Father Roche and duly honoured, after which the deputation withdrew.

THE ROYAL COMMISSION ON THE LAND ACTS.

MR PETER FITZGERALD'S EVIDENCE RESUMED.

The Royal Commission on the working of the Irish Land Acts resumed, and closed, its sitting in the County Courthouse, Cork, on Friday morning. The Commissioners present were—Sir Edward Fry, chairman; Mr George Fottrell, Mr George Gordon, and Mr Robert Vigors. Mr R R Cherry, Q.C., secretary, was also present.

At the sitting of the Court, Mr Peter Fitzgerald was recalled and examined by Mr Campbell. There were two or three other cases of deterioration of holdings by the tenants on the Ponsonby Estate, which he wished to mention. A tenant who had bought the interest in a holding in 1894 at £1,200, the old rent being £132, had it reduced to £120 in 1891.

The President—There must have been some rushes there in 1891? I wasn't there then. The President—it appears to me you make no effort to assist the Commissioners in court, and then you complain. Mr Campbell—Was your assistant on the ground in 1891? Yes.

The President—You know there is a clause in the Act excluding tenants from the court when there is unreasonable conduct on the part of the tenants. Mr Campbell—Yes; but these tenants have gone into court, and the Commissioners have decided that deterioration on the part of the tenant is no reason why a fair rent should not be fixed.

Proceeding witness said that the farm to which he referred was along the banking of a river, and it was impossible to prevent the tenant's cattle trespassing. It was plain the trenches had been choked up for many years, and the cattle could easily get across, but except they were actually caught trespassing it was impossible to prosecute.

The President—That is not within the scope of our inquiry. Witness—I only mention it as a discouragement to landlords to remain in the country. He considered that in cases of pre-emption the landlords should be able to get money at the same rate as the tenants get it. He thought if the landlord gave the security of his estate it ought to be as good as the secured offered for the tenant.

By Mr Murphy—The reduction on the tillage holding was about 25 per cent. Oats, wheat and potatoes were the staple products of tillage farms. Since 1881 there had been a fall of 2d or 3d per stone in oats. Much wheat was not grown. He was dissatisfied with the reduction of 25 per cent on the tillage farms. There was a great difference between tillage and grass farms. The reduction on the Croker estate was from 15 to 25 per cent. It was to the interest of the tenant to have the land deteriorated at the time the Commissioners came on the land, but the policy, while it answered for the moment, was a very short-sighted one.

Further cross-examined—In the case he had mentioned on the previous day, in which the tenants had been evicted and the negotiations for purchase had fallen through in consequence of the refusal of the Land Commission to sanction 17 years' purchase, these tenants were put in at the rent which formed the basis of the purchase. The rents were punctually paid by the tenants, and they were 30 per cent over the poor law valuation, and about 50 per cent below the rents which they were paying before they were evicted.

To Mr Murphy—That was the Hamilton estate. Mr Murphy—I join with you in the regret that the purchase was not successful. To Mr Gordon—The rental of the Dunraven estate was £10,000, or, if anything, under it; and the former rental was £14,000. To Mr Fottrell—Evictions have now almost ceased. He often found it hard to get men who were evicted. He would like to mention that at the time those proceedings went on before the Land Commission to reinstate these tenants, he was encouraged to go on, by reason of the fact that Mr Commissioner O'Brien was sitting on the Mathew Commission, which was sitting for the purpose of reinstating evicted tenants.
