By Mr Murphy—The reduction on the tillage helding was about 25 per cent? Oats, wheat and potatoes were the staple products of tillage farms. Since 1881 there had been a fall of 2d or 3d per atone in oats. Much wheat was not grown. He was disastisfied with the reduction of 25 per cent on the til age farms. There was a great difference between tillage and grass farms. The reduction on the Croker estate was from 15 to 25 per cent. It was to the interest of the tenant to have the land deteriorated at the time the Commissioners came on the land, but the policy, while it answered for the moment, was a very short-sighted one.

Further eroes-examined—In the case he had mentioned on the previous day, in which the tenants had been evicted and the negotiations for purchase had fallen through in consequence of the refusal of the Land Commission to sanction 17 years' purchase, these tenants were put in at the rent which formed the basis of the purchase.
