FUNERAL OF REV. DAVID TILSLEY.

On Wednesday last the remains of the Rev David Tilsley, Congregational Minister of this city, were interred in St. Munchin's Church yard. Previous to the departure of the funeral from the Congregational Church, Caherine Place, a service was held at 9 a.m., presided over by the Rev R H Semple. The church was crowded by a sympathetic gathering of people of all sections, amongst whom were the following:—Revs T F Abbott, F Langbridge, T B Robertson, W E Bentley, John E Green, William Meara, and Pastor A Grant Gibb. The service having been opened with prayer by Rev Mr Mears, the hymn, "Peace, perfect peace," was sung, after which Rev Mr Semple read the 90th Psalm, also Rev., 7th chap, from the 9th verse. Mr Semple then delivered a most touching address, referring to the lovesble character of the deceased clergyman, his unassuming manner, and his untiring zeal as a pastor and friend. Mr. Tilsley, an Englishman, loved the country of his adoption, was at home in his Irish surroundings, and soon became a favourite with his Irish, friends. Following the address, two verses of the hymn. "Rock of Ages" were sung when the service was closed with prayer and benediction, by Rev Mr Green. On arriving at St Munchin's, the coffin was carried to the grave by members of the Congregational Church. Pastor A.G Gibb read portions of the 2nd chapter of Hebrews, and also from the 1st chapter of Ephesians. Prayer being offered by Rev A Mackinlay, of Cork, Chairman of the Irish Congregational Union, the service was brought to a close.
