defence fund. They had taken the opinion of counsel, which, however, seemed to be somewhat erratic, probably owing to wrong instructions. They wanted to try and get clauses introduced into the Bill which would make the position of Veterinary Inspector safe. They might be considered safe, but as they stood they might be made more of less subject to the whims and caprices of the County Counsellors that would be, and the Boards of Guardians as they are at pre-

Mr Johnstone considered the remarks which were being gone into were outside the business of

that meeting.

Mr Winter said he was desirous to know whether the gentlemen whose names were read as attending the extraordinary meeting were members of that Association, and if not, why were the minutes of that meeting read there at all?

The Chairman thought these gentlemen should

fight their own battle.

Mr Clery did not think this was a subject for

discussion at that meeting.

Mr Winter-I have not been allowed to explain exactly what I wanted to say. I ask the quastion, and I would like an answer, it these gentlemen who attended that extraordinary meeting are members of this Association, and if not, why not? I maintain that if these men want to share in the benefits of this Association they should become members of it.

Mr Coll said he would ask the meeting to overlook the slight irregularity which had taken place, because the objects of that meeting were practically a detence of the profession, and for its protection. He thought they had a very good discussion on the matter, and it might have very good results. It was their futy, and it should be the object of that society to put forward their claims, and to endeavour to have them recognised (hear, hear).

Mr Howard said that some members seemed to think that this defence association was a new association altogether. That was not so. There was a new fund, but there was no new associ-

Mr Watson said that he was hopeful of bringing these men inside the ranks of that association, and they would see that it was one worthy of their support (hear, hear). He had invited them to join, and he had no doubt but in a very short time a great number of them would be members of that association. He thought the cause of calling that extraordinary meeting justified the means taken for doing so (he r, hear).

Mr Clery thought that Mr Watson was perfeetly justified in his action, considering the limited time that there was for discussing a subject so important to the profession (hear,

hear).

Mr Winter-How many men, who have subscribed to the defence association, are members of this association?

Mr Watson-It would take me some time to go

into that question.

Mr R-a-How many have sub cribed?
Mr Watson-Forty have responded to the

circular ?

Mr Coll considered that these were questions which need not be asked. He regarded it as the laty of that Association to encourage other mempers of the profession to join it, and there is no setter way of showing that it deserved support han by defending the right: and supporting the daims of the profession (hear, heir).

Mr Christy agreed with Mr Winter that it rould be right to insist, as far as they sould, up hose members who subscribed to the defence fund prieter more or mate need which colours materials with quality was not as largely represented as con'd have been desired. As usual, good animals found ready purchasers, and rough farmers' horses sold well, there being a good deal of parchasing for tram purposes, and also for the French Army, the prices varying from £20 to £35. Otherwise, the fair was, on the whole, a dull one owing to the inferiority of stock. There was a large attendance of buyers, but their shipments, as indicated above, were not very conaiderable.

Considerable purchases were also made at Mr E C Winter's Veterinary Establishment in Queen street, and Mr Coll's, The mas street.

SUDDEN DEATH.

This afternoon Mr Coroner DeCourcey and a jury, of which Mr R Rice was foreman, held an inquest on the body of Maria Taylor, an immate of Dr. Hall's Alms House, Nicholas Street, who was found dead in her room this morning. evidence showed that deceased was 70 years of age, and was last seen alive by Mary Anne Bouchier, who occupies a room underneath the apartment in which the deceased had lived. This morning, about a quarter to ten o'clock, the caretaker was informed by his wife that Miss Taylor had not made her appearance, and on the door of her room being opened, she was found lying on the floor at the foot of her bed. The deceased had been alling during the winter. Dr Mulcahy stated that he examined the deceased. There was an abrasion on the side of the head which was probably caused by the deceased having fallen against the bed. This, however, had nothing to do with the cause of death, which he believed was due to heart disease. The jury returned a verdict accordingly
