LIMERICK GENTLEMAN DROWNED AT BALLINROBE.

With very sincere regret we announce the sad death of a popular gentleman, Mr Wm Beaumont, son of Mr John Beaumont, of this city, which took place under tragic circumstances on Saturday night last. Mr Beaumont was returning home to his residence at Ballinrobe, county Mayo, and the night being intensely dark and desperately inclement, it is supposed he missed his way and fell into the river Robe, and was drowned. The body was recovered on Sunday evening apparently near where the accident occurred. The news of Mr Beaumont's death will be received with feelings of unfeigned sorrow by a wide circle of friends in Limerick, amongst whom he was a general favourite. A young man of fine physique he took an active part in athletics, and also in aquatic as a member of the Limerick Boat Club. He was also a member of the old Limerick Merchants' Fire Brigade. He occupied a responsible commercial position in this city, and subsequently, at the time of the Boer rising, went to the Cape and joined the Mounted Police force in that country. Returning to Ireland, he soon after entered an extensive land agency office at Ballinrobe, and for some time past has acted as agent over the property. He was extremely popular, and his demise in the prime of life is deeply deplored in the district where he has resided for several years. We deeply sympathise with his father and family in their great bereavement.
