### LIMERICK SUCCESSES IN THE UNIVERSITIES.

Yesterday was degree day at the Royal University, Dublin, and the announcement was made that the first of the first class Classical Scholarships, value £50 for three years, was won by Mr P. Bartley, of this county. A telegram has also been received, stating that Mr W. Nanan has won a Junior Exhibition in Trinity College, value £60, while his elder brother, Joseph, has been awarded a gold medal on his elevation to the membership of the Bar. These three successful candidates are all past pupils of the Jesuit College in the Crescent, where they distinguished themselves greatly during their school career.

### FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR RATHKEALE.

On Thursday evening a farmer named Thomas Cowhey, residing at Finneretstown, about three miles from Rathkeale, met his death under peculiarly sad circumstances. During the day the deceased had been engaged with his horse and cart in drawing hay to Foynes. On his return in the evening he proceeded to re-load the cart, with the view of starting early for Foynes the following morning. While loading the horse became restive, and the deceased, who had been forking the hay to a man, endeavoured to restrain the animal, which, however, continued fractious, with the result that the cart got upset and fell on Mr Cowhey. When extricated, it was found that he was severely bruised, and had several ribs broken. Dr. Magner, Rathkeale, was immediately sent for, but the poor man had succumbed to his injuries before his arrival. The deceased, who belonged to a respectable family, was very popular in the neighbourhood, and the greatest regret is felt at the sad occurrence. An inquest was held yesterday evening by Mr M. J. M. Donnell, solicitor and coroner, Rathkeale, and a verdict of accidental death was returned, the jury adding a rider expressing sympathy with the deceased's relatives.

### BOTANICAL SCHOLARSHIP.

Mr E. J. Butler, son of Mr T. Butler, R.M., and brother of the professor of Modern Languages at Queen's College, Cork, has been awarded by her Majesty's Commissioners of the Exhibition of 1891, a Research Scholarship of £150 for one year, renewable at the discretion of the Commissioners. He will fulfil the conditions by the pursuit of botanical research at the Jodrell Laboratory, Kew, continuing there the researches on the foreign organisms associated with the roots of plants commenced in the Botanical Institute of the College, and which constituted part of the basis for his nomination by the College. These scholarships were founded for the encouragement of research aiming at technical progress; and Mr Butler's work may be expected to forward the progress of scientific agriculture, which already owes so much to the labours of Hellriegel and others in the very path on which Mr Butler is entering. Mr Butler, R.M., was for some time stationed in Limerick, where he made many friends.
