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IRONICLE Limerick no, as our correspondent, "Tempus Edax," points out in his letter this evening. It seems to be more the exception than the rule to find all the public clocks pointing exactly to the same time, and the observer is at his wits ends to know which is telling the truth. "Formerly," says our correspondent, "a few private firms paid the necessary twelve guineas yearly for a daily wire giving the exact hour from Greenwich, but this has been discontinued." The Post Office receives a daily wire, but its public clock "does not show the exact time, and is often considerably wrong. The same may be said of the Railway clock." He makes the practical suggestion that the Postal authorities might convenience the public by displaying window a magnetic needle which oscillate at a given moment each day, and as the needle at present moves inside the building, the initial expense of fixing it for the benefit of outsiders would be a mere bagatelle. The Harbour Board and the Corporation, while urging on the Post Office the desirability of providing this convenience, could also arrange between themselves to obtain a wire from Greenwich, and so have strict time kept in the public clocks. Another idea would be the firing of a gun at the barracks at noon, such as is done in Edinburgh and some other cities. It is really more than a sentimental matter, for, as "Tempus Edax" observes, " in a city of the importance of Limerick it should be possible for the public to command something more than an approximation to the correct time." To professional men, to business men, time is everything-correct time especially-and we trust the practical suggestions of our correspondent may be carried into effect immediately-

MR GLADSTONE'S FUNERAL.

A NATIONAL TRIBUTE.

VAST DEMONSTRATION OF SYMPATHY AND REGRET.

THE SCENE IN THE HOUSES OF PAR-LIAMENT, WESTMINSTER HALL AND WESTMINSTER ARREY

PECIAL TELEGRAMS

London, Saturday.

The Press Association telegraphs—The Nation to-day, paid its last tribute of respect to the memory of the statesman who for more than sixty years has occupied so distinguished a position in its public service. At the earliest opportunity after the receipt in London of the news of the death of Mr Gladstone it was unanimously resolved by both Houses of Parliament, on the proposition of the Government to present to the Queen an address praying Her Majesty to grant a State funeral to the deceased statesman, and also to request Her Majesty to give directions for a public monument to be erected at Westminster in his honour. Mr Balfour, in moving the adjournment of the House of Commons, on the sad occasion, announced that it was intended to place upon the mountment an inscription expressive of the public admiration and attachment, and of the high sense entertained by the House of Mr. Gladstone's " Rare and splendid gifts and his devoted labours in Parliament, and in great offices of the State." Her Majesty's gracious ascent to the prayer of Parliament having been received both Mouses formally resolved to attend the funeral, and the necessary preparations were immediately undertaken by the Duke of Norfolk as Earl Marshal.

SCENE IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS. . In conformity with the resolution arrived at last week the members of both Houses of Parliament met to-day for the purpose of attending the funeral of Mr Gladstone. The House of Commons was opened at a very early hour but up to 9. o'clock very few members put in an appearance. The earliest arrival was Sir Benjamin Stone, who came before eight o'clock, with the view of taking a final photograph of the catafalque in Westminster Hall before the coffin was borne to its last resting place. Sir James Joicey, Mr H C Richards, and Mr Bartley were among those who arrived before nine o'clock, but the great body of the members did not enter the House until some time afterwards.
