### FUNERAL OF THE LATE DEAN HAMMOND, P.P.

The funeral obsequies of the late Very Rev  
Dean Hammond, P.P., V.G., took place yesterday  
in the R. C. Church, Newcastle West. The sacred  
edifice, which was draped in black, was crowded  
by the people of the town and surrounding dis-  
tricts, and there was a very large  
attendance of clergymen. Evidence of mourning  
at the demise of a distinguished clergy-  
man was most general throughout the town.
