#### SUDDEN DEATH AT BALLINACURRA.

##### POSSESSED OF £1,500.

Yesterday evening a man named John Healy,  
who lodged with the occupants of a cottage in  
Ballinacurra, was found on the roadside dead.  
The deceased, who was about 75 years of age, had  
returned from California a couple of years ago,  
and had since resided in Limerick, having led a  
very quiet life. The police were apprised of the  
occurrence, and on the clothes which deceased  
were being searched, a sum of over £6 was found,  
together with a deposit receipt for £800. The  
police made a further search of the apartments  
which the deceased had occupied and in  
one of his boxes another deposit re-  
ceipt was found indicating that in all he  
possessed something like £1,580. The Coroner  
was communicated with, and directed the police  
to summon a jury to inspect the body, and an  
inquest will be held if considered necessary. It  
is supposed that the cause of death was heart  
disease. The deceased, who was unmarried, had  
led a very retired life, and was of a very charitable  
disposition.

#### CHURCH OF IRELAND.

The new Chancellor of the United Diocese of  
Cashel, Emly, Waterford, and Lismore, appointed  
by the Bishop in the room of the late Judge  
Warren, the Right Hon Dudgson Hamilton  
Madden, one of the Judges of the High Court,
