They did not wait to see that there might be another view of the whole affair but started their strike, and did not approach the Directors in a reasonable spirit to have the grievance ventilated if they thought there was a real grievance. Now outsiders have been constituted as leaders of the men, the breach is being made wider and the prospect of a speedy settlement can hardly be entertained.

A very influential deputation was introduced by Major Jameson, M.P., to the Chief Secretary at Dublin Castle, on Tuesday, with the object urging on the Government to institute productive works in West Clare, which could not alone give immediate and much-needed employment, but would largely develop the resources of the county. One of the projects suggested is the construction of a line of Railway from Kilkee to Carrigaholt, a distance of eight miles or so. Carrigaholt, the nearest village to the mouth of the Shannon, possesses all the natural resources for the carrying on of deep sea fishing.
