DEATH OF MR D. M. MAUNSELL, J.P.—We re-
 gret to announce the death of Mr Daniel Meares
 Maunsell, J.P., which took place last evening
 at his residence, Ballywilliam, Rathkeale. The
 deceased gentleman, who had reached the ripe
 age of 79 years, had been in failing health for
 some time past. He was the oldest surviving
 member of a very old Limerick family, and as a
 landlord and county gentleman was held in the
 highest esteem by the people of the district
 amongst whom he constantly resided. Mr
 Maunsell was for many years a member of the
 Grand Jury and an *ex officio* guardian of the
 Rathkeale Union, but lately owing to advancing
 years had taken little part in public affairs. He
 is succeeded in the property by his brother,
 General Maunsell, C.B. Funeral leaves Bally-
 william at 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning for
 St John's Church, Limerick, arriving there about
 two o'clock.
