SALMON FISHING AT GLIN.—Salmon fishing for this year commenced in the Lower Shannon yesterday. There were for a first day good takes of fish in several weirs. In the Knight of Glin's Longbrook fishery, which is accounted the best weir in this river, a splendid salmon, weighing 27 lbs., was caught, and in a small engine owned by Mr. W. Bleekerhassett, four good fish were captured. The drift net boats are not yet fishing, but the crews are making preparations for Monday next. It is to be hoped they will meet with better success this year than they experienced last season.
