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LIMERICK NURSING ASSOCIATION.

At Thursday's meeting, reported in our issue of that evening, a long and interesting report from the Ladies' Committee of Management was read. The following are extracts :-

"This Committee hold the first of their ings on the 5th and 14th of July, 1997, for the purpose of making arrangements for the reception of the two Queen's Jubilee Nurses supplied by Miss Dunn, General Superintendent of the Queen's Institute in Ireland, at the request of the general meeting held in Limerick on the 4th of June 1897. The Committee engaged a rest of June, 1897. The Committee engaged a resi-dence for the Nurses at 57, Catherine Street, and the two ladies—both Queen's Nurses—Nurse the two ladies—both Queen's Nurses—gaurse Gardner (Head Nurse) and Miss Browne, arrived in Limerick on August 2nd, and presented them selves before the Committee. They were in-structed to wait upon as many of the medica serves perore the Committee. They were in structed, to wait upon as many of the medica men, and elergymen of both denominations in the oity, as time permitted, leaving cards with their addresses, and to hold themselves in readiness for such cases as might be brought under their

notice.
"The work carried on from that day to the present time is set out in the following summary as taken from the books kept by the Nurses an examined weekly by one of the secretaries and member of committee.

"The cases were sent in as follows: 1897—August, 14; September, 7; Octob r. 11; November, 13; December, 20, 1898—January, 17; Fbruary, 22; March, 23; April, 14. Total, 141.

The Committee held their meetings with regularity on the first Wednesday of every month, and have kept a minute book of their proceedings The attendance at these Committee Meetings was very full and regular, and on two occasions special meetings were held for consideration of

particular subjects.

From this source there has already been lodged with the Treasurer a sum of \$20.64.
