## FATAL CAR ACCIDENT NEAR THE CITY.

Catherine Reynolds, wife of deceased, stated that on the exeming of the occurrence they were driving in from Adere with two other friends. Witness—I had not; I passed that way going out; the horse was in the habit of shying slightly, and swerred as little on this occasion towards the side where the deceased was sitting just as they were coming towards the engine; he did not notice that anyone had falled off the car just as they were coming towards the engine; he did not notice that anyone had fallen off the car, and drove on first wenty or thirty yards until he was told to stop by the other persons on the car. Dr Muleahy deposed that he examined the deceased about twenty minutes to eight; he

deceased about twenty minutes to eight; he found him unconscious; there was a cut on the back of the head which was bleeding; blood was also coming from one of the care; there was no other mark; in his opinion, death resulted from a fracture of the base of the skull.

A Juror arked whether the doctor could say if the wound was caused by striking against some sharp substance, such as a wheel, or by falling on

falling on the road.

Sergeant McManus, in reply to the coroner, stated that the engine had been in the same

place since Friday.
William Strickland, re-called at the request of William Strickiand, re-called at the request of Head Constable Feeney, stated the engine had broken down, and was laid up in this place for repairs; the precautions they had taken consisted in lighting lamps be night and keeping men to watch there; the lamps used were white, not red; at one side there was twenty-four feet from the engine to the wast rable; he was then at the angine to the water table; he was there at the time of the accident, but did not notice that anything happened; the car passed on as if no

engine had been there.

The Coroner—As far as I see, nobody is to blame for the accident. It is an unfortunate

occurrence.

The jury returned a verdict of death from fracture of the base of the skull caused by a fall from a sidecar; and they added that they deeply sympathised with Mrs Reynolds and the family of the deceased in their sad bereavement.
