SUDDEN DEATH A man named John Trousdell died rather suddenly on Sunday at a bouse in Arthur's Quay. Mr Trousdell was an ex-National School Teacher, belonging to the Kilrush district. and it appears that during the past few weeks he was travelling in the North of Ireland. On Saturday he returned to Limerick, and his wife came up from Kilrush to meet him. That night in the lodging house he complained of being unwell and retired to rest, but apparently obtained no relief from his illness. It was suggested to him that a doctor should be sent for, but he declined to allow this, and continued to linger during the night, and about half past five he was found dead in bed. The circumstances were communicated to the City Coroner, who, on inquiring into the matter, did not think it necessary to hold an inquest.

FATAL OCCURRENCE AT KILRUSH.

A SEA CAPTAIN DROWNED.
