DEATH OF CAPTAIN BUDGE.

We regret to announce the dead of Mr Henry Fudge, retired sea captain, which took place yesterday afternoon under painfully suddin citcumstances. Captain Fudge was having some exercise on a bicycle, which he rode up and down the readway near his residence in Henry-street. He seems to have become exhausted, and slipped off the machine, without however sustaining any bodily injury. He walked into his own house and rected on an arm-chair for a short time, after which he proceeded up stairs, and soon after one of the household was startled to find him lying on the floor. Dr Holmes was immediately sent for, but it was found that Mr Fudge was beyond all human aid. The deceased. who was in his 73rd year, was an old and r spected citizen, his kindly, generous, and courteous manner winning for him hosts of friends. He spent fifty years of his life at sea, and his career was an event ulone. He had been connected with various vessele, the property of old Limerick firms, and was in the Mediterranean at the time of the Crimean War, some of. these vessels having been obsreed hy Government for taking out Captain Fudge's brother, Mr. R. Government for out the aupplies. Fudge, was in command of the ship, in which he himself served. The deceased was for many a Captain in the ¥+&rs Limerick Steamship Company's service, and he retired intoprivate life BOTTO four or five years ago, since which time he has constantly resided here. He was a most interesting conversationalist and a sincere friend, and his very sudden demise is deplored by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. The funeral is to take place on Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.
