We regret to announce the death which took place yesterday, of the Right Rev Charles Graver, D. D. Protestant Bishop of Limerick. His Lordship, who had attained the ripe old age of 86, was educated in Trinity College, Dublin, of which he was a Scholar, Fellow and Protessar; was President of the Koyal Irish Academy from 1861 to 1866, Dean of the Chapel Royal and Chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant from 1860 to 1866, and Dean of collecter trom 1864 to 1866. He was an extremely able writer on mathematical subjects, and very early in his career published some very valuable suggestions in reference to the publication of the Brebon Laws. He was one of the best type of Irish scholars and gentlemen, and his brackfundedness and intellectuality have descended to his children, one of whom is Mr. Altred Perchaul Graves, the gifted literateur; Mr. C.E. Graves, the author of Hawarden Horace, and Mr. Arnold Graves, whose efforts for the promotion of technical instruction in Ireland have been so fruitfiel of Graves, whose efforts for the promotion of technical instruction in Ireland have been so fruitfiel of good results. The death of so distinguished a mathematician and archsologist will be widely regretted throughout Ireland, not only by his co-religionists but also by all familiar with his kindly personality and profound scholarship.
