In these circumstances Andree would probably be found by the fish expedition under Professor Nathorst, or the Danish expedition under Herr Amdrof. In case no news concerning the expeditions I be expected before September.

#### RELEASE OF JOE MULLETT.

Joe Mullett, one of the Invincibles sentenced to imprisonment for life in 1883 for participation in the attempt to murder Mr Field, a respectable Dublin stationer, was last evening released from Maryborough Prison and conveyed to Dublin. Mr Mullett was one of the jury engaged in trying a highway murder case in Green street Courthouse, and after several days he wrote a note in the jury box to tell his wife he could not be home that evening. He handed this note down from the box, and it was passed to the Crown Solicitor by a policeman. Persons connected with the Invincibles conspiracy who were present concluded at once that Mr Field was in treaty with the Crown and hanging the accused, and his fate was accordingly decided on. An evening or two afterwards going home to his residence in North Frederick street, he was rushed on by a party of men who lay in wait, having come on a car to Ardwick street corner opposite, and a sword was plunged into his breast. He afterwards recovered, but his health was shattered. Inquiries into this case led to the discovery of the perpetrators of the Phoenix Park murders. The carman was Kavanagh, who had driven away the Park murderers from the scene of the assassination. Fitzharris, alias Skin the Goat, the cabman who conveyed the murderers from a publichouse in Dame street to the spot where the murder was committed, still remains in Maryborough Prison.

"For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" was sung by the merchants and shippers at the Liverpool Exchange the other day when Colonel Hector Macdonald visited them. "I thank you very heartily for your welcome," was his simple acknowledgment.

A fatal accident has occurred at the Gold Extraction Works at Glasgow. Two men named John Adams, 33, and George Smith, labourer, were badly burned through a quantity of cyanide of potassium blowing off a retort, and died soon after.

The 23rd Field Company of the Royal Engineers, quartered at Chatham and commanded by Major S. R. Rice, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness for embarkation for South Africa upon receipt of instructions from the Quartermaster-General.

Reports from the Ivory Coast state that severe fighting has taken place between the French and the Tojo people who inhabit the country east of the Cavally River. Many were killed, and the name of Dr. Legimois, a white man, is mentioned among the casualties.
