The Chairman read over Sergeant Sullivan's deposition.

The defendant, in reply to the bench, said she had no notion of doing anything of the kind. She had whiskey taken, and she ran when she saw the sergeant, thinking he was going to arrest her.

She was returned for trial to next Quarter Sessions, being allowed out on bail, herself in £5, and two sureties of £2 10s each.

Martin Halloran again appeared on bail on a charge of alleged perjury at the Summer Assizes.

The case was further adjourned for a fortnight for the attendance of a witness.
