 ing so sad as having to make an after-  
 noon speech. If the proposer said some-  
 thing severe; if he would deride one or  
 abuse one he would furnish a text, because  
 one could get up and talk against that; any-  
 one could get up and straighten out his own  
 matter (laughter), but when the gentleman  
 up and merely told the truth, what could be  
 done (laughter). It was difficult to choose from  
 texts which he had furnished. He saw  
 that his master in the art of oration twenty-  
 years ago, Mr Dewey, and there was also Mr  
 Tate. They would notice that while they three  
 were absent there was a pleasing tranquillity  
 in America—a building up of public con-  
 fidence (laughter.) They were doing the  
 best for their country. They had spent  
 their lives in serving their country, and  
 never served it to so good advantage  
 when they were out of it (laughter). Mr.  
 Tate afterwards gave a humorous descrip-  
 tion of how he learned to make "impromptu"  
 speeches by preparing them carefully a week  
 beforehand, writing them out, learning them by  
 heart, and later handing a printed copy to the  
 speaker (laughter). He didn't want to sit down  
 and say something serious. He had said  
 things that would make them better than when  
 they came there. He would, therefore, like to  
 use one serious word which they could carry  
 back to their children, and the old people who  
 are not able to come. Let them take this as a  
 message from him: "When in doubt tell the  
 truth."

#### IOUS CHARGES AGAINST AMERICAN JUDGES.

The Supreme Court Judges have begun an  
 inquest on for-contempt against Professor Kenneson,  
 lecturer on Law before the New York University.  
 It is reported to have said, in addressing a  
 debating class a month ago—"Amid the  
 existing conditions, this city, where ignorance  
 and political favouritism prevail upon the Bench,  
 and the pernicious system of electing biased  
 Judges, it may seem Utopian on my part  
 to urge upon you nobility in your life calling,  
 and knowledge and high ideals will never  
 send you to a boss for nomination to the  
 honor lead the average Judge to name you as  
 one. Such things go by political favour not  
 merit." In this connection it is interesting  
 to note that Mr Martin Lockwood, a leading oil  
 millionaire, declared on Saturday before the  
 Industrial Commission that a Judge of the New  
 York Court of Appeals, whom he named, receives  
 a subsidy from the Standard Oil Company, and  
 acts as in the company's favour in cases in which  
 it is concerned. Much interest has been excited  
 by these revelations.

#### PURCHASE OF KILLARNEY.

The House of Commons yesterday,  
 Mr Lough asked whether £12,000 a year out of  
 the income derived from Irish quit and Crown rents  
 now spent on London parks would be applied  
 towards the purchase of the Muckross estate,  
 Killarney, as a public park.

A. J. Balfour said he did not think this  
 could correctly be regarded as a question of the  
 distribution of expenditure between Great Britain  
 and Ireland, and as to the purchase of Muckross  
 as a public park, he thought the policy  
 of purchasing a public park so far from great  
 centres of population was very doubtful in-
